Obviously, a huge catastrophic event would have had to occur to produce this decadent state of the world. The "gap concept" was later

popularized by mention in the margin notes of the Scofield Reference Bible.

And, entire episodes in Mark mirror Homeric episodes, including stilling the sea, walking on water, feeding the multitudes, the Triumphal E
